This is yet another octagonal twist. It's really just a simple closed-back octagonal twist, with some detailing around the edges to clean up extra paper. The crease pattern is quite straightforward, and while the folding sequence to get all the relevant reference folds is not very hard I'm not quite ready to document all that at this time.

Give it a try, and be the first person on your block to have octagonal ninja throwing stars! Or perhaps use it as a name tag for Christmas or birthday presents? The possibilities for cute little folds are endless.




